Creating New Works of Art

During the off season Darrell and I prepare for the next upcoming season. We are creating new works of art, taking care of the repair of our facility.

The base for the painting above is a photograph of a cottonwood bark, which I found on the Cedar Trail.



I printed the photograph on bark paper to enhance the bark structure and painted the Dryads (Greek: tree spirit) out of the bark. The par fleche painting to the left is based a par fleche by Darrell, which I scanned and altered digitally before painting on the printout.

News from Browning

The **new high school** is now under construction and is coming along well. On the other hand the casino is not doing well. A short time back our neighbor was beginning excavation for his home, when he discovered **unmarked graves of about 30 children** who had attended the Willow Creek Boarding School. This neighboring property was formerly owned by Darrell, and the graves extend onto our property as well. Most children probably died of typhus

about 1900 –1910.

Before the typhus epidemic the Blackfeet Tribe had demanded a closure of this school because of its bad hygienic condition, which was denied by US authorities. The Blackfeet Tribe has signed an agreement with the State of Montana for the reconstruction of the St. Mary's water canal and funding has been approved despite of George Bush's veto.

The Cobell versus U.S. Interior Dep. case continues on with the government continuing to try to delay a fair settlement. Information on this case can be found online or from Indian
